



Indiana State Senate 2023 Legislative Update

SB 200: Local Street Safety Matching Grant Program

- Indianapolis and the entire state have seen increased traffic crashes and fatalities, which are especially dangerous for pedestrians and cyclists. That's why I introduced this legislation to establish a street safety matching grant program to help cities improve pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure. The program would provide up to \$25 million in matching funds each year.

SB 203: Local Infrastructure Funding

- I authored this bill to increase the amount of road funding that goes to local projects and specifically allocates \$300 million to go towards the local road and bridge matching grant fund each year. Additionally, it would increase the funding that Indianapolis can receive under these grants to better represent our infrastructure needs.

SB 205: Task Force for the Reduction of Violent Crime

- I've also authored this bipartisan bill to create a task force to study legislative proposals for reducing violent crime across the state. I'm proud to share that this bill passed the Senate unanimously and is now being considered in the House.

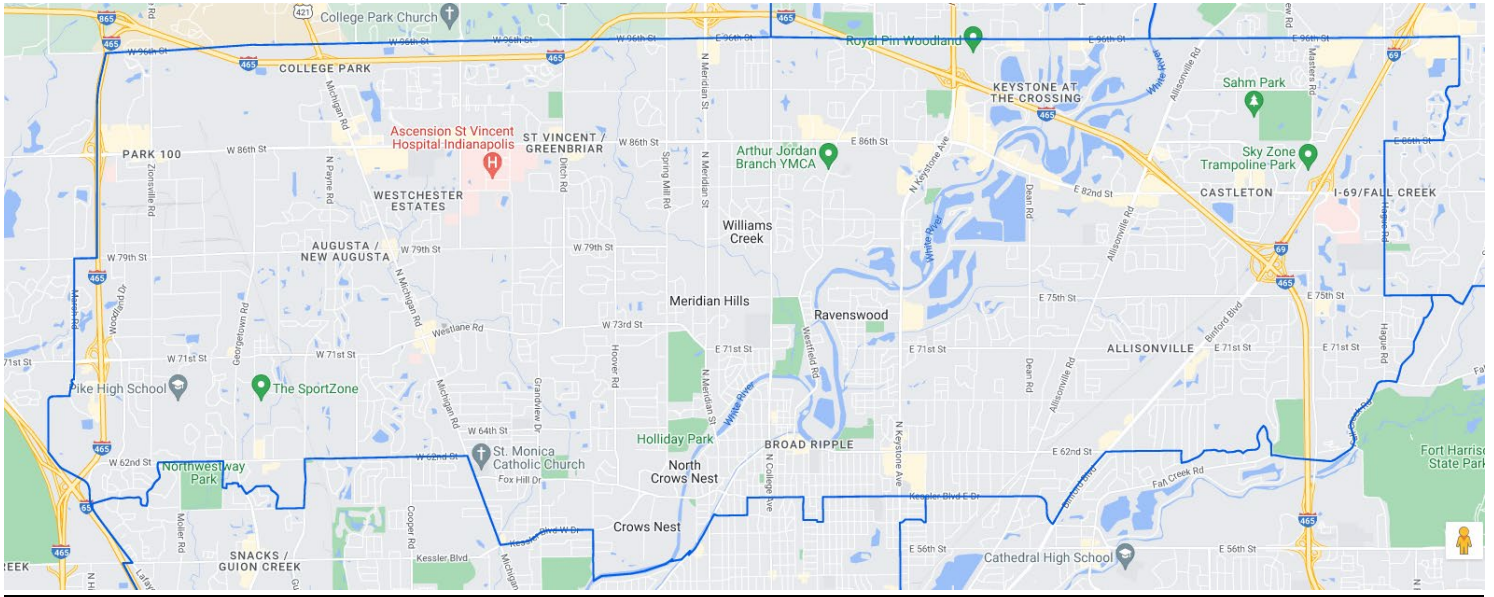
SB 283: Marion County Road Funding

- Prior to this legislative session, and for several decades, the State's road funding formula that hasn't fully count Indianapolis' population for the purpose of allocating gas tax revenue to fund our local roads and streets. This bill that I am authoring with two of my Republican colleagues will secure an approximately \$8 million increase in annual road funding for Indianapolis. It has passed the Senate and is now being considered in the House.



Senate District 30

Senate District 30 covers the North side of Indianapolis including portions of Washington, Pike and Lawrence Townships. The boundaries are generally 96th street to the north, I-465 to the west, Kessler Blvd/ 62nd street to the south, and Hague Road to the east.



Biography

- State Senator Fady Qaddoura was elected to represent Indiana's Senate District 30 in November of 2020. Before his election, Sen. Qaddoura was already an experienced public servant, working on behalf of the people of Indiana for over a decade. He worked first for the Indiana General Assembly, then the Indiana Department of Workforce Development and Indiana Family and Social Services Administration, before being appointed the controller and CFO for the City of Indianapolis in 2016. During his tenure with the city, he was credited with balancing the city's \$1.2 billion budget with no tax increases after more than a decade with structural budget deficits.
